
Team Roles & Team Processes

What's the Situation?

The penguins steal a car* in an elaborate plan involving two stages.

Stage 1: Deception...

Stage 2: Action!

We will analyze this team within the context of Belbin's 9 Team Roles (the tendency to behave and contribute and interrelate with others in a particular way) because each penguin has specific roles within the team that complement the others and contribute to the overall goal.



The "Boys" (official descriptions)

Skipper: the unofficial leader of the penguins; a tough and cunning penguin. He creates plans and commands the team




Left to right: Private, Kowalski, Skipper, Rico

Kowalski: second-in-command; very neurotic; analytical. He turns on music and participates in the plan

Private: the youngest and kindest of the penguins; speaks with a British accent. He fakes his death and presses the accelerator

Rico: very quiet; greedy; loves to eat. He hotwires the car



Coordinator:

These individuals are mature, confident, clearly illustrate the team's goals, and delegate tasks.

Skipper yells "Rico!" to Rico to delegate the task of fixing the car engine. Skipper is very confident when he delegates the tasks, yelling them out with gusto.

Plant:

These individuals are adept at solving problems in creative ways.

Skipper planned the deception stage with the "death" of Private, implementing ketchup for blood and the egg as brain matter.







Shaper:

Rico is a courageous penguin who thrives under pressure and can ensure the team doesn't lose momentum. However in his single-mindedness he may overlook the importance of his teammates' feelings and speak sharply to move things forward. His only word in the scene is a rough "hey," to call attention to the approaching car and keep the team focused.

Specialist:

As the squad's bombs and ammunition expert, Rico brings in-depth knowledge of a key field to the team and their daring-do. He is dedicated, self-motivated as the only one to catapult himself into the car, and has a particular useful skill set in hotwiring cars. He does not have the chance in this scene to dwell on technicalities or overload teammates with technical information, but that is a common specialist trait.

Just Smile and Wave Boys...

Teamwork is a dynamic process. It is not as easy as just being able to "smile and wave!" The complementing roles of these team members allowed them to efficiently and effectively formulate a creative strategy, implement it precisely with backups ready, and maintain group cohesiveness and participation. Only with teamwork this good could a group of penguins so successfully steal a car.
